

Section One

INTRODUCTION

About the SC Appalachian Council of Governments

The SC Appalachian Council of Governments (SCACOG) is a voluntary organization of local governments in the northwest corner of South Carolina, serving a region which includes the counties of Anderson, Cherokee, Greenville, Oconee, Pickens, and Spartanburg, as well as the 42 municipalities therein.

Since its formation in 1965, the Council has served the dual mission of tackling issues of regional significance and providing services to local governments. Economic and community development, transportation, infrastructure development, resource management, aging services, and workforce development are all issues of regional importance in which SCACOG takes an active role. At the local level, the agency's services include general administration, technical assistance, training, planning, grant writing & administration, and information & mapping services.

Background and Purpose of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

The Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) is a program of the United States Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA). The Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965 (PWEDA) requires federally designated Economic Development Districts, such as the South Carolina Appalachian Council of Governments (SCACOG), to develop and maintain a CEDS in order to both establish a regional economic development strategy and maintain the region's eligibility for EDA

grant competition and programs. The program requires annual updates of the CEDS as well as a full re-write of the CEDS at least once every five years.

In 2017, SCACOG submitted to EDA a new five-year CEDS entitled *A Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy for the Appalachian Region of South Carolina: 2018-2022.* This document is the work of many committed individuals from both the private and public sector who desire to support the continued, positive growth of the South Carolina Appalachian region. The 2018 Annual Performance Report will highlight the economic development activity in the region as it pertains to the goals identified in the 2018-2022 CEDS and provide an updated snapshot of economic conditions throughout the region.

Section Two

REGION OVERVIEW

SC Appalachian Region: Current Economic Conditions

Since the publication of the 2018-2022 SC Appalachian Region Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy last year, there have not been any significant changes in the economy. Conditions continue to improve following the recession, yet median household and per capita incomes continue to lag behind the state and the nation, despite wage pressure from a tight labor market.

Unemployment rates are at or near historic lows across the region. In September 2018, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported county unemployment rates ranging from a low of 2.9% in Greenville County, to a high of 3.7% in Cherokee County. This could pose a problem for new and expanding businesses as labor can be difficult to find. There are, however, pockets of very high unemployment in

each county that could be a resource for workers under the right circumstances.

In spite of the tight labor market, economic developers have had continued success in recruiting new businesses to the region and helping existing businesses expand. Between October 2017 and September 2018, nearly 4,000 new jobs and over \$1 billion in capital investments were announced. (See the appendix for a complete list of announcements.) The majority of these projects fall into at least one region-wide target industry category, expanding the existing clusters and increasing the demand for a skilled workforce.

Section Four

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GOALS & HIGHLIGHTS

GOAL 1: TARGET INDUSTRIES

Promote not only the growing regional target industries of advanced materials, aerospace, automotive, bioscience, and energy, but also local target industries which are unique to individual counties and communities.

- Between October 2017 and September 2018, total capital investment in the region exceeded
 \$1 billion.
- New projects were announced in all regionwide target industries totaling \$531,360,000 and 2,465 jobs.
- Other announcements in the region totaled an additional \$466,350,000 in capital investment and 1,373 jobs.

GOAL 2: WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Cultivate an efficient and skilled 21st Century workforce through enhanced training and coordination of resources in the SC Appalachian Region.

- Spartanburg Community College received a \$526,225 ARC grant to enable SCC students to access cutting-edge integrated systems training.
- Tri-County Technical College opened its new campus in the Oconee Industry and Technology Park in Westminster. The \$5.5 million facility will offer work-based learning opportunities for high school students and adults.

GOAL 3: PRODUCT DEVELOPMENT

Improve regional economic development capacity by increasing the quality and quantity of shovel-ready sites and suitable buildings for expanding and locating businesses.

- Commercial real estate firms report:
 - 1,698,230 square feet of speculative industrial space was delivered between October 2017 and September 2018.
 - 3,373,179 square feet of speculative industrial space is under construction for delivery in early 2018.
- 11 sites totaling 2,549.44 acres have been vetted through the SC Department of Commerce Palmetto Sites Program.
- 14 sites totaling 1,394.56 acres have been vetted through the SC Department of Commerce Certified Sites Program.
- Spark Center SC received a \$477,965 ARC grant to make improvements at their facility which provides temporary manufacturing and office space for new and expanding businesses.

GOAL 4: INFRASTRUCTURE

Make the SCACOG region attractive for economic development by sustaining and enhancing physical infrastructure.

- Work continues on the \$231 million 85-385
 Gateway Project, bringing the first interstate flyover ramps to the region and improving the transportation of both goods and people.
- ReWa, the region's largest wastewater treatment provider, has begun work on a \$46 million project to increase treatment capacity in Greenville County.
- 22 ARC and CDBG grant-funded water, wastewater, and streetscape projects worth
 \$17.6 million are underway in the region.

GOAL 5: ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Make the SCACOG Region the most entrepreneur friendly region in South Carolina.

- SCACOG continues to offer the Entrepreneur Friendly Community Toolkit to municipalities in the region.
- Regional partner agency Ten at the Top held a series of Entrepreneurial Support Providers Workshops to foster collaboration among those organizations, including SCACOG, who assist the entrepreneurial community.
- The Upstate Capital Providers Network provides a forum for non-traditional lenders (Angel Investors, Micro Lenders, Venture Capitalists, etc.) to connect with one another, share best practices, and refer clients when appropriate..

GOAL 6: ACCESS TO CAPITAL

Increase access to business capital in the SC Appalachian Region.

- Grant funding continues to drive public sector projects throughout the region. At present there are:
 - 32 CDBG and ARC grants being managed by SCACOG staff.
 - 30 projects receiving \$14,153,980 in funding and leveraging an additional \$9,820,922 in project investment.

GOAL 7: LOCAL ASSET-BASED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Strengthen the unique, local community assets which have a significant impact on regional economic development.

- 4 cities in the region—Inman, Iva, Pendleton and Woodruff—received \$2,322,555 in CDBG and ARC grant funding to assist with streetscape projects to enhance their downtowns.
- \$1,822,555 in grant funds were awarded to other community development projects aimed at neighborhood revitalization.
- Park and trail projects totaling \$4 million received \$1.6 million in ARC funding.

GOAL 8: GLOBAL COMPETITIVENESS

Carry out the goals, objectives, strategies, and tactics articulated in the Upstate SC Metropolitan Export Plan.

 In 2017, the Upstate Alliance, lead organization for the Brookings Institution's Global Cities Initiative in the region, launched the Global Competitiveness Council to guide the implementation of the Upstate SC Regional Export Plan and Foreign Direct Investment Plans.
 Membership includes public sector, private sector, and non-profit organizations.

GOAL 9: GLOBAL COMPETITIVENESS

Attract more Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) to the region.

- Foreign Direct Investment for FY17-18 represents:

 - ♦ 1,449 jobs
 - ♦ 17 companies
 - ♦ 11 countries
- State, regional, and local economic development organizations continue to travel internationally to market the region at trade shows and other industry events.
